LSTCA IS AT A CROSSROAD

The Lake Louise Community Nonprofit Corporation was established in 1995 to "promote and administer programs regarding the economics, communication, health and social needs of the Lake Louise Community". The name of the corporation was changed to the Louise/Susitna/Tyone Community Association (LSTCA) in 2015 to better reflect the entire lake community encompassing the three lakes and surrounding areas.

LSTCA is treated by the MatSu Borough as a community council and has had some fairly significant clout in the borough. The LSTCA has accomplished numerous projects since its inception and has the potential to do more to further the needs of the lake community. A few of the more notable accomplishments are:

- the Fire Suppression Caches spread around the lakes for use by community members when needed;
- the purchase of large chemical fire extinguishers placed at the lodges to aid in suppressing vehicle or boat fires;
- the permit from the State of Alaska that allows the placement of the buoys at the channel;
- the purchase of liability insurance that covers activities at the channel;
- the purchase of Directors and Officers insurance that protects the board of directors;
- purchase of the warning signs placed at the channel and boat ramps;

- the purchase of the buoys for use at the channel and potentially in Cameron Cove;
- the purchase of a groomer that the Wolfpack snow machine club uses to groom the trails on the lake system in the winter;
- the improvements at the causeway boat ramp which improved the boat launch and parking area.

There are many more examples of projects that have been accomplished by the LSTCA over the years all to improve the "economics, communication, health, and social needs of the Lake Louise Community".

The reason that the LSTCA is at a crossroad is because of the lack of interest and participation in the activities of the association. At the last annual meeting of the LSTCA in July of 2019, there was not a quorum of members nor a quorum of board members to have a legal meeting. Because of the lack of attendance, new board directors



could not be elected. This critical action was postponed until the annual meeting which will be held on July 18, 2020 at 11am. The meeting will be at Lake Louise Lodge. The lakes community needs to get involved and attend this meeting and elect new director. Also, persons interested in being on the board need to come forward to so the vacant director seats can be filled.

Channel Report

We are proud to announce as of June 1st the water level is up and passage through the channel should be better this year. We are hoping for a wetter year then 2019. Boaters using the Channel during the 2019 boating season were faced with very low water conditions. Numerous long-time users of the Channel experienced the dubious honor of getting high-centered on the sand bars located on both sides of the Channel as well as inside the Channel. Boats stuck in the Channel passage caused some potentially dangerous conditions. Utilizing the North on the hour and South on the half hour for safe passage system was critical in reducing the hazards for all boaters. Unfortunately, there are still boaters, property owners and visitors, who do not follow the North - South Channel Passage system. This is very dangerous and it is a matter of time until there is a serious collision in the Channel. All it takes is a little bit of planning to ensure that you go through the Channel at the appropriate time. Let's all work to educate all boaters to help reduce the potential for a serious boat collision.

Numerous volunteers showed up for a work day at the Channel on August 10th. New high-visibility sigs were erected on both ends of the Channel, the brush was cut on the Lake Louise side to improve visibility and trash was collected. Some buoys were repositioned in hopes of finding deeper water but unfortunately, there was no deeper water to be found. Here is hoping for better water levels in 2020.

A 6' by 10' storage shed has been purchased by the LSTCA to house the DR mower and other equipment at the channel. The DR mower has been stored outside the last several years and a storage shed was needed to house the mover and protect it from the elements. The Wolfpack helped haul the shed across the lake and position it. Thanks to the Wolfpack
